



Self-Guided Walks

Catsfield and the 1066 Country Walk circular

Welcome to the High Weald National Landscape, an unspoilt medieval landscape. This walk starts from the village of Catsfield, and includes part of the '1066 Country Walk'. Refreshments may be taken midway at the Wylands Fish Farm or at the conclusion of the walk in the White Hart pub in Catsfield.

Distance and duration	A five mile walk, taking about 2½ hours to complete

I-Spy Something to look out for on your walk



Two

This walk starts from the car park in the centre of Catsfield, behind the village hall.

Leave the car park and turn left along the road.

At the crossroads turn right around the perimeter of the church, now a private dwelling, and continue up the hill to the junction.

Cross the road here and turn right and continue alongside the road.

Go past the playing fields and a pair of semi-detached bungalows on the left.

On the left go down a short incline to a gate and into a large field.

Go right diagonally across the field heading for the tall pines amongst the trees opposite.

Go over the next stile and onto the road, cross to the other side and continue to your left.

After a short while the path dives off to the right, taking you away from the traffic on this bad bend.

When you re-emerge onto the road continue a few yards further on to the entrance to Farthings Farm.

Turn right here and continue along the farm drive.

Follow this drive for $\frac{3}{4}$ mile, after the first couple of hundred yards it ceases to be surfaced and becomes more of a farm track.

Just beyond Farthings Cottage go straight on through a gate and continue through a wooded area.

At the end of this area go through another gate out into open space.

Carry straight on and climb the hill ahead of you.

At the top of the hill another footpath comes in from your right, alongside a substantial finger post.

Turn right onto this path and go back in the general direction from which you have just come, initially going up a slight incline.

At the top of the incline the path continues downhill, passing through the remains of a gate.

The path is now confined by a fence to the right and the treeline to the left.

Go through another gate and continue straight ahead.

The path widens out into a track and continues in the same direction, go to the top of the hill.



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Three

At the top, beyond the open space, go straight across the track beyond and through the gate on the opposite side.

Follow this confined path to a gate at the bottom of the hill.

Make your way carefully down the slope to the side of the road.

This is a very bad bend, and drivers will not be aware of you until they are almost on you, so take particular care in crossing, listening carefully for oncoming traffic is essential.

Go along the lane directly opposite and then take the turning on the right.

Go through the gate across this lane and continue straight on.

Just beyond 'Stone Cottage', which is on the left, you will find a gate on the right.

Go through the gate and walk along the top of this embankment until you come to another gate and a bridge.

Go over the bridge and turn left and walk around the edge of the field, going up the field until you find another gate on the left.

Go into the next field and head for a point just below the end of the farm buildings.

Go through the gate at this point and then up the slope to the right of the trees ahead of you.

Go through another gate and then proceed downhill along the track beyond.

At the bottom go through the five bar gate and turn immediately right and walk along the edge of the field. This can be quite overgrown in summer months.

Another gate on the right will take you into a wood, go over a bridge initially and follow the path through the wood.

You will see a lake beyond the trees on the left, do not be tempted to move out onto the lakeside, where there will probably be folk fishing.

Eventually you will exit the wood into a field.

Keeping the tree line on your right continue up along the edge of the field.

You will emerge onto a track, bear to your right and follow the track up hill.

You are now on the site of the Wylands Fish Farm. Head in the direction of the corrugated iron building ahead of you, this is actually a cafe and is a good place to stop for refreshments.

Turn right at the cafe and continue along the surfaced track, passing between two lakes, and continue in the same direction up hill.

Four

At the top of the slope look out for a track going off into the woods on the left.

Go through the gate and follow this path until it comes to the main road.

Turn left and walk along the road, you are probably best keeping on the left as there is more space to get off the road on this side, and you will be more visible to traffic.

After about 300 yards, just before a bungalow, go through the five bar gate leading into a large field.

Bear to your right, making for the gap between the next tree line and a cluster of trees in the field.

Continue up the slope making for the outside edge of the trees ahead of you.

Go through a gate at this point and follow the confined path to the next gate.

Go through this gate as well, making for the gates in the hedgerow at the bottom of the field. (Do not turn right and make for the gate and drive beyond).

You will pass through two more gates and come out alongside the road into Catsfield.

Turn right along the road, passing the disused church again and back around to the car park.

The White Hart pub in the village is worth a visit for refreshments.

At all times please follow the Countryside Code



Respect everyone

- be considerate to those living in, working in and enjoying the countryside
- leave gates and property as you find them
- do not block access to gateways or driveways when parking
