

Welcome to the High Weald National Landscape, an unspoilt medieval landscape. The current state of the climate in the High Weald is leading to wetter winters, this combined with the famous Wealden clay can lead to very difficult walking conditions in rural areas. Fortunately, there are still a good variety of quiet country lanes that can offer an acceptable alternative. Lane walking is not as boring as you may think, there are often many attractive properties to admire, and the views can be most impressive. What follows is one such walk, when undertaking the walk always be aware of traffic and walk in single file on the right of the road, except when a bend to the right will make you invisible to oncoming vehicles, in which case walk on the left of the road.

I-Spy Something to look out for on your walk

Standing in the road with your back to the church, turn right and proceed along the lane past the White Dog pub.

This is Ewhurst Lane, and you will be walking along it for 1¾ miles. There are no turn offs to be aware of.

Eventually at a T-junction turn right onto Tufton Lane.

After ¼ miles turn right onto Adams Lane.

Shortly you will come to a fork in the road, Adams Lane continues to the left. You need to take the lane straight ahead which is signed to Ewhurst, this is Sempstead Lane.

Continue along Sempstead Lane for 1 mile until you come to a turning on your right.

Take the right turn, Lordine Lane, which is signposted to Ewhurst Green.

Continue along this lane for another mile and at the T-junction turn right back to the church.

Given the hilly nature of this walk the White Dog pub is an excellent venue for some well deserved refreshment.
